Chef Christine Hà, the first blind contestant and winner of Season 3 of TV's MasterChef, visited The Lighthouse of Houston during April's Beeping Easter Egg Hunt. Chef Hà, who owns two Houston-based restaurants, The Blind Goat and Xin Chào, gave a brief welcome address, and then joined in the fun of the Beeping Easter Egg Hunt.


Chef Hà, an accomplished speaker and writer with degrees from both UT-Austin and the University of Houston, has neuromyelitis optica or NMOSD, in which a person's own immune system attacks the optic nerves and spinal cord. She began losing her vision in 2004, and had nearly complete loss of vision by 2007. Following her triumphant appearance on MasterChef in 2012, Chef Hà was named the winner of the Helen Keller Personal Achievement Award in 2014, an award given to people and organizations that "demonstrated outstanding achievement in improving quality of life for people with vision loss."

Assistive Tech Focus: Be My Eyes App

Be My Eyes is a free app, available for download from the Apple App Store and the Google Play store, that connects blind and low-vision people with sighted volunteers and company representatives for visual assistance through a live video call. That assistance can be anything from distinguishing colors, checking expiration dates, or navigating a busy crosswalk.



The idea for Be My Eyes came from Danish furniture craftsman, Hans Jørgen Wiberg. Wiberg, while working with the Danish Association for the Blind, connected the need of the blind and low-vision population in performing everyday tasks to the ubiquity and accessiblity of mobile phones and real-time video calls. After receiving support in its start-up phase, Be My Eyes launched in 2015. The app now boasts over 400,000 blind and low-vision users and over 10 times that number of volunteers.
